

Q. Without that you would not regard it as certain ^{in that stage} A. No sir.

Q. And yet a few moments afterwards the condition of the patient might become such that it would be entirely obvious would it not A. Very apparent within a short time.

By Dr. Butler:

Q. If you were called to a patient in the condition of this one, where she had been subject to this flowing and diarrhoea, what method would you adopt to ascertain whether it was simply a case of flowing A. In private practice I should call in a proper attendant and make an examination unless the patient is in imminent danger

Q. In this case would you not have used the attendant to examine A. Depend upon the age and experience of the attendant. If I had an experienced attendant or nurse I could call readily I should call her.

Q. Do you use the remedies that Dr. Lamborn speaks of using the day before, that of oil A. I have tried it in diarrhoea, and in times past tried it more
