

This is a name lost in the shuffle of time since it was given to the locality before the white settlement.

As to Agquahega, it appears to be a late Indian name for Damaricove Island, (1717) and needs consideration as such. In my opinion the islands on the Maine coast (Mushygan, Damaricove, Sequin and around Pennequin) were settled bef. 1620, not by colonists families but by companies of men engaged in fishing and trading. The evidence is too strong to be ignored and only the molech of Plymouth Rock prevents acceptance of this proposition. Hundreds of sail were located there every year, <sup>1606-1619</sup> and they must have had ~~long~~ habitations ashore in the summer months to live in and buildings for curing their fish. Every early voyager refers to this condition. It was not a settlement in the sense of community planting, but I think it clearly indicated that men lived there year round at Mushygan as early as 1615. Hence
