Ques. Are these windows all barred. Ans. Yes; formerly with a cast iron sash, but a man could take his feet and break it out; since that we have taken bars of iron and drilled holes through and put a rod of about half inch wrought iron so as to stand the knocking; the openings are the same $6\frac{1}{4}$ by $7\frac{3}{4}$, and the protection to keep the patients from breaking them is a piece of
